# The Power of Hope

Last year, more than 15,000 people in Canada gave **Gifts of Hope** to address the greatest challenges faced by girls around the world. In this report we share seven stories of the strength and resilience those gifts helped support.

#### EDUCATION

## **Learn for Life**

**IMPACT:** The \$18 **School Essentials for a Child** gift raised **\$41,245** last year. That means **46,026 children** received 1,782,982 learning materials, such as books, pencils and calculators.

ur School Essentials gift provides everything a classroom needs, from pencils and notebooks to student desks and well-trained teachers. This past year, this gift also did something extra special. It helped make sure classrooms have one more thing they need: female teachers. When girls have female role models in the classroom, they are more likely to attend school and excel in their studies. This Gift of Hope helped give 200 young women in Sierra Leone the support they needed to become

uring the COVID-19 pandemic, Uganda experienced one of the longest periods of school closures in the world. The large break in learning, and the disrepair many schools fell into during that time, discouraged many children from returning, even after schools reopened.

# Stigma, Shame, Secrets? No Time.

**IMPACT:** The \$25 **Pads for Periods** gift raised **\$93,355**. We distributed **32,332 pads**, educated girls about menstruation and broke down stigmas.

n Geita, Tanzania, 25% of girls don't study beyond primary school, and periods are one of the reasons girls drop out of class. Pads for Periods mean they don't have to.

"We make menstrual pads so that girls can come to school all the time [even when they are on their periods]," says Edinah, a student who participates in one of Plan's menstrual health clubs. "It prevents them from being absent."

These clubs also tackle the stigma around periods that can keep girls at home. When boys and girls have real, open conversations about periods, everyone gets on board to support getting girls what they need for menstrual health.

## No More Hunger

IMPACT: The \$50 Food Basket gift raised \$314,952 and distributed 12 million kilograms of food to 325,011 people. (That's 4.8 Olympic-sized pools filled with life-saving food.)

n May 2023, Cyclone Mocha ripped through Myanmar and Bangladesh, washing away homes, shops and all the possessions families hold dear. Ma Nu Barr lost everything she owned. Now, she, her husband and their six children live in a camp for internally displaced people.

Thanks to the Food Basket gift, Ma Nu Barr and her family receive cash assistance of about C\$90 every month so they don't go hungry while living in the camp. They also attend a child nutrition program that helps them learn how to build a balanced diet with the foods available in the area.

## **Powered Up**

IMPACT: The \$100 **Girl Power** gift raised **\$573,381**. It reached **114,197 girls** in 11 countries.

o keep her son safe from the ongoing conflict that started in 2021 in her home region of Myanmar, Bawk Nu, 24, was forced to flee with her family. Now they live in a camp for internally displaced people. Trying to set down roots in an unfamiliar place, Bawk Nu wanted to find a way to earn a steady income.

The Girl Power gift helped complete part of that equation: During two months of training, Bawk Nu learned basic computer skills, plus how to create a

### **Just Go for It!**

**IMPACT:** The \$10,000 **Humanitarian Aid** gift raised **\$30,000**. It supported **64,510 people** who have been displaced or are living in crisis situations.

voiding armed groups was just one of the dangers that Gabriela, her mother and her sister dealt with as they fled Venezuela for Colombia. When they finally arrived in northern Colombia, they found new opportunities, but also new threats. "[Men] would harass us and offer us money if we would go with them," Gabriela says. "One man grabbed me and said he would not let me leave until I went with him."

When Gabriela joined a workshop organized by Plan International, she learned what gender-based violence

is – and how to protect herself. She also learned about her rights as a migrant and as a young woman.

"I really liked that we talked about family planning, because pregnancies have increased among migrant women and it's not always by choice," she says.

After the workshop, Gabriela organized a women's kickball league to bring people together. Being active helps her mental and emotional well-being and also builds a network of connections within her community – an important part of increasing safety.

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# **Generation G:**


How giving unites one father-son duo

hen Ali Nabavieh was 8 years old and living in Tehran, Iran, the city was bombed. Nabavieh was at home getting ready to go to class while, nearby, bombs were destroying his school. Had the bombs fallen 30 minutes later than they did, he says, "I wouldn't be here right now."

Nabavieh knows that hardship can happen suddenly. So giving to causes that support education and health is something he's invested in. And he has made it a priority to share that commitment with his son.

"He's 13 now, so he understands quite well [why this commitment is important]," Nabavieh says.
"Going through the Gifts
