Voices for Change: A Study of Activism Among Young Women in Canada

Methodology

This study was conducted on behalf of Plan International Canada to better understand the challenges faced by young women activists in Canada. This study focuses on women aged 18-24.





Sample

n=350 respondents

- Female
- Aged 18-24
- Reside in Canada

All respondents are members of the Angus Reid Forum. This survey was conducted in English and French.

Young women in Canada are passionate about activism.

Nearly two-thirds (63%) engage in some level of activism, and over half are interested in pursuing or are currently in a career dedicated to social issues. Almost 2 in 5 (39%) feel that their efforts make a difference in their community.

Young women face significant barriers to engaging in activism that impact their motivation or ability to engage.

Over half (53%) of young women have feared for their personal safety when engaging in activism, and many (39%) have previously faced harassment. 8 in 10 have witnessed other women face backlash, which for many discourages their motivation (79% out of those who witnessed). One third have decreased their participation due to the rise in cost of living.

There is a spectrum of causes that young women care about.


When asked which topic they cared most about when it comes to activism, there was no single issue that dominated. This underscores the diversity of their interests and priorities in the realm of social activism.



Frequency of Activism Engagement

Nearly two-thirds (63%) of young women in Canada engage in some level of activism.

Frequency of Engaging in Activism



Activism is broadly defined in this survey to encompass any action you take on social issues to bring about social or political change, such as: speaking out online about issues to drive awareness, starting a campaign, joining grassroots movements, signing a petition, attending a rally or march, writing a letter to a policymaker, donating to a cause, etc.

Personal Safety and Activism

Over half (53%) of these young women have feared for their personal safety when engaging in activism, and almost 2 in 5 (39%) have previously faced harassment.

Witnessing Backlash

An alarming 8 out of 10 respondents have seen other girls and women face backlash when engaging with activism.



Impact of Witnessing Backlash

Among those who witnessed this backlash, 79% report it has discouraged their motivation to engage in activism to some degree.

Cost of Living Impact on Activism

One-third of young women (34%) have decreased their participation in activism due to the rising cost of living.

Cost of Living Impacts on Activism







Climate change/environmental sustainability, health and wellbeing, and gender-based violence/gender equality are the top 3 causes young women care the most about.


Most Cared About Causes



Experiences Contributing to Interest in Activism


Exposure to documentaries or books, personal experiences of injustice, and witnessing issues within their family/community are the top contributors to interest in activism among young women.
